**Fire Danger Index**

The North Dakota Fire Danger Index provides an indication of rural fire potential for grasslands, including its ability to spread. The index contains five ratings: Low, Medium, High, Very High, and Extreme.

Your local fire service recommends certain guidelines based on the fire danger index rating. For North Dakota hunters, anglers and other outdoor recreationists, some legal restrictions go into effect when the fire danger index in a specific county or counties reaches the Extreme category.

In counties where the Fire Danger Index is in the Extreme category:

- Open burning such as a campfire is prohibited.
- Off-road motorized travel is prohibited except for persons engaged in a trade, business or occupation where it is required.

- Fire extinguishers and fire tools are required.
- Smoking is restricted to inside of vehicles, places of habitation and areas cleared to mineral soil.

Local (city/county/tribal) jurisdictions may also institute burn bans, in accordance with the fire danger index, if conditions require. Contact your local emergency manager to inquire about the status of fire restrictions that may be in place.



## 2012 Fair Chase Hunt is On!

As we move to the field this fall there are many issues for us to be aware of, the condition of habitat and various impacts that will alter how we do things.

One of the immediate issues to be aware of is the dry conditions that exist out there. I don't know if it's been this dry during the early season for quite some time. A careless cigarette tossed from a window or a chain dragging on the asphalt or rocks can ignite a fire. Pay extra attention to when you park before walking off in search of game. Wait until the motor quits making noise as the heat dissipates. A fire will not only ruin an area for hunting this year, but could close to the area for next year if on private lands.

Invasive species are not only invading the waters, but weeds have been moving across the state for years. They continue to move with the help of unsuspecting or careless outdoors people. Try to learn what we are fighting and where the problems are coming from. The NDGF has lots of information to educate us using the outdoors. Let's make the effort to help control the spread of these species that are damaging our water ways and fields before more damage occurs.

The loss of habitat because of the change in agriculture programs will be one of the greatest impacts on wildlife production the state has seen in

quite some time. As CRP payments subside the farmers will till them up in search of additional revenue. The wildlife will move into the better habitat becoming an easier target for hunters, predators and Mother Nature who will manage the overcrowding.

The NW quarter of the State is under attack in the pursuit of oil with almost everything else taking a back seat. The land owners have been inundated with impacts from the development of oil well, water wells, new electrical transmission and distribution lines, tens of thousands of trucks, new road construction and thousands of new residents. It has changed lives; habitat and wildlife patterns will continue to change for years.

We need to beware of these impacts and plan our hunts accordingly. Landowners deserve our respect and consideration by asking to use their properties in advance and with patience and courtesy. If you get told "no," thank them for their time and honor their request. Be aware of the field conditions whether dry or wet, because rutting up roads and fields when wet is as bad as billowing clouds of dust rolling across farm and ranch homes.

Ask permission, share the harvest, pick up after yourself and others, and enjoy the hunt.

### Hunting Shape and Dog Care

It's true round is a shape, but not the best one for enjoyable hunts. The hunting season is here and if you are like me, many of you waited until the last moment to get into better shape. When I was in my 30's the adult sports and chasing the kids got me prepared. Now as I have matured? Spare time is hard to find and exercise is pushed aside. I would hazard a guess it is the same for you and your dog may be in the same condition as you. suggest

We have more opportunity than our dogs to prepare for the season. We should have been walking, riding bicycles or hitting the stairs. We should have begun working our dogs, doing more cardiovascular training, and weight conditioning.

There is no time like the present to push yourself, or ask someone else to help you with training.

The dogs need to toughen their pads, get their muscles worked out gradually rather than expecting them to be in hunting shape starting the season. Dogs have been waiting on us to get them into shape as they can't do it themselves. They don't have the irregular terrain or vegetation they are going to run into when hunting for upland birds. Not to many water retrievers from those kennels either.



When did you have them in the water the last time? Swimming is a great exercise for conditioning for both you and your dog. Take them for walks, bring a ball or dummy to retrieve, there are lots of places on public lands to work them. A couple of hours a week can do wonder for both of you.

You always have to pay attention to the weather. Dogs can suffer from heat exhaustion as easy as we can, so avoid long periods of strenuous activity

during the hottest part of the day.

Bring water for yourself and greater amount for your dog.

Bring some basic medical supplies along with you for attending to cuts scrapes, thorns, and thistles.

It's late but there's still time to gain some conditioning. Start with 20 minutes walking around the neighborhood and add 5 minutes with

each outing. If you can't find the time for exercise, there are plenty of stores selling new hunting clothes to replace those your wife ruthlessly shrunk making them just too tight to use this season. Hope you have a good season and are able to share it with first time hunters and friends.

## Hunter Orange Requirement

Every person, while hunting big game, shall wear a head covering and an outer garment above the waistline, both of daylight fluorescent orange color, totaling 400 square inches or more and both to be worn conspicuously on the person. This section does not apply to any person hunting big game with bow and arrow during special bow hunting seasons. Additionally, while the muzzleloader and the deer gun seasons are in progress in an area, all big game hunters, including bow hunters, are required to wear a head covering and an outer garment above the waistline of solid daylight fluorescent orange color, totaling at least 400 square inches.



## Deer Season for Young Hunters Opens Sept. 14

Friday, Sept. 14 at noon signals the start of a nine-and-a-half day deer hunting season for youth ages 12-15. Licensed youth ages 12 and 13 are allowed to hunt statewide, but only for antlerless white-tailed deer.

Deer hunters age 14 or 15 with a “youth season” license can hunt statewide for any deer, except antlerless mule deer in units 3B1, 3B2, 4A, 4B, 4C, 4D, 4E and 4F. In addition, a special license is required to hunt antlered mule deer in those same units.

After opening day, hunting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset. Solid daylight fluorescent orange vests or coats, and hats are required for all young hunters and their adult mentors.

Each youth deer hunter must be under direct supervision of an adult while in the field. In addition to the deer license, hunters must possess a general game and habitat license and hunting certificate.

The youth deer season closes Sunday, Sept. 23.

## Sandhill Crane Season Opens Sept. 15

North Dakota’s sandhill crane season opens Sept. 15. Hunters are urged to use caution and identify birds to prevent shooting at whooping cranes as they begin their fall migration.

The sandhill crane season is open through Nov. 11 in unit 1 (west of U.S. Highway 281), and through Oct. 21 in unit 2 (east of U.S. Highway 281). Limits are three daily and six in possession in unit 1, and two daily and four in possession in unit 2. Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to 1 p.m. each day through Nov. 3. Beginning Nov. 4, shooting hours are extended until 2 p.m. each day.

In addition to other licenses required, prospective hunters need a \$5 crane permit. Hunters can apply online, or print out a resident or nonresident application for mailing, at the North Dakota Game and Fish Department website, [gf.nd.gov](http://gf.nd.gov). Harvest Information Program certification is required. To get HIP certified, access the department’s website, or call (888) 634-4798.

Hunters can also send the permit fee, along with personal information, including height, weight, social security number, date of birth, color of hair and eyes, and hunter education number and state issued, to Crane Permit, NDGF, 100 N. Bismarck Expressway, Bismarck, ND 58501.

# Sportsmen Against Hunger Accepting Goose Meat

On a trial basis, North Dakota's Sportsmen Against Hunger Program is accepting donations of goose meat taken during the early Canada goose season. Much like the popular SAH deer donation program, hunters can bring in their goose meat to participating processors. However, hunters must remove the breast meat from the birds before processors can accept them.

Hunters can clean their geese at home prior to delivery to a processor, but breast meat brought from home without a wing or head attached to the meat, must be accompanied by written information that includes the hunter's name, address, signature, hunting license number, date taken and species and number taken.

Hunters may also deliver geese directly from the field to a processor, but identification must remain attached to the bird until in possession of the processor.

Since no goose carcasses or feathers are allowed inside processing plants, hunters must be able to ensure proper disposal and clean-up of carcasses.

"We have 11 locations across the state that will handle goose donations," said Ann Pollert, Executive

Director of North Dakota's Community Action Partnership, which sponsors SAH as part of its effort to serve low-income families across the state. "We're kind of testing the waters this year to see if goose donations can work out as well as deer have in the past."

Hunters interested in donating are encouraged to call processors before dropping off geese, to have a clear understanding of how goose breasts will be accepted and the

processor's hours of operation, Pollert said.

North Dakota's early Canada goose season closes Sept. 7 in the Missouri river zone and Sept. 15 in the rest of the state, though goose meat is only accepted through Friday, Sept. 14. Daily bag limit is 15 with 30 in possession.

The early hunting season is intended to reduce local Canada goose numbers. Despite liberalized regulations the past several years, with longer seasons, large bag limits and expanded shooting hours the statewide population remains high, with numbers well above population goals. For additional information and regulations, hunters should refer to the Game and Fish Department website.



## 2,200 Antlerless Deer Gun Licenses Available

More than 2,000 licenses for antlerless deer are still available after the North Dakota Game and Fish Department recently completed its second lottery drawing.

These remaining licenses will be issued on a first-come, first-served basis beginning Sept. 19. These licenses are only available to individuals who have not already received a lottery or landowner license, and are valid only during the regular deer gun season, Nov. 9-25.

Hunters can apply online starting Sept. 19, and paper applications received prior to that will also be processed Sept. 19. Residents and nonresidents are eligible to apply. Paper applications will be available approximately Sept. 11 at the Game and Fish Department website, [gf.nd.gov](http://gf.nd.gov), and at Game and Fish offices and county auditors late in the week of Sept. 10-14. Paper applications will not be available at retail license vendor locations.

Applications hand-delivered to the department's Bismarck office will not be processed while the applicant waits.

## Swan Hunt Lottery Held, Licenses Remain

North Dakota's swan lottery has been held and more than 300 licenses remain. Only hunters who do not have a swan license for the 2012 season can apply, as regulations limit hunters to one license per year.

Beginning Sept. 5, all remaining licenses will be issued on a first-come, first-served basis. Resident and nonresident hunters will be able to apply online, or print out an application to mail, at the State Game and Fish Department website, [gf.nd.gov](http://gf.nd.gov). Hunters may also request an application by calling the department's Bismarck office at (701) 328-6300. The license fee is \$5 for residents and \$25 for nonresidents.

The statewide tundra swan hunting season is Sep. 29 – Dec. 30.
